

In the glorious sun, on the morning of Friday 3rd June, eight seemingly unconnected people descended upon Holy Trinity Church, here in Bengeo. But like in any good murder mystery, there was one thing that they had in common, they were all bell ringers. And so, the attempted feat, began. (PS, no murders took place).

What was actually taking place, in celebration of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second's 70th Year on the throne, was what is known as a peal. As a bit of brief understanding, bell ringing is a combination of music, rhythm, patterns and maths, and entices an eccentric bunch to say the least. A peal is where bells are rung continuously in such a way that the bells always ring in a different order, a minimum of 5,040 times, without repeating one order once. The mathematically minded of you may have noticed that 5,040 is the exact amount of times you can reorder 7 things, in this case bells, without any repetition. Depending on how heavy the bells are this can take a number of hours. On this Friday, on relatively light bells, just under half a tonne, it took 2 hours and 45 minutes. It is a task often referred to by some as madness and others as a commendable task of endurance. This would be the first time in 16 years, that such a piece of ringing has been

attempted in Bengeo, and what better reason to do it than for the Queen.

Though peals are rung by experienced ringers, Holy Trinity has just been teaching a number of new ringers to ring the bells, something you may start noticing taking place before the service on Sunday mornings, between 9.45am and 10am. From being complete novices in February, who had never touched a bell rope, a number of the learners were able to learn so quickly that they could ring for the Easter Day Service, and now have their own practice nights on Monday evenings. Bells are an important part of life, and not consigned to the religious, as they are used to celebrate, like with the jubilee or at weddings, to ring out messages. Bells across the country rang out for COP20 in reminiscence of a warning of danger, and in commemoration and sorrow, such as for Armistice or at a funeral.

If anyone is interested in learning, then it is a task open to everyone from 11 to 100 years old. Pop along to Holy Trinity Bengeo on a Monday evening, or email **secretaryeaster.hcacr@gmail.com**. On The Doorstep

May and June are through but in these months there has been a lot to see and enjoy on our doorstep. The trees put on their luscious green coats of leaves, filling the gaps in our landscape and many summer flowers started to bloom and flourish. We have seen the fading of the spring blooms and the emergence of flowers like Wild Rose, Campion which can be seen in red (dark pink), white or a lovely delicate pink, Common Mallow, Bird's Foot Trefoil, sometimes known as eggs and bacon due to it's yellow and red colouring or the rather unassuming and often overlooked, Pineapple Weed. Pineapple Weed grows along many of our field paths in Bengeo, it gets its name because when crushed it has a

distinct pineapple smell, also the flower heads have no petals and have the shape of mini pineapples, it is part of the Daisy family.

Then towards the end of May I was thrilled to hear once again, the screech of the returning swallows and see them swoop and swirl above our roof tops, always a joy.

As we head into July and August some of the flowers like the Wild Rose, Garlic Mustard, Honesty and

others will fade, but some will continue through into the next couple of months and be joined by yet more flowers. Towards the end of June, beginning of July, Waterford Heath and surrounding areas will

start to fill with patches of Goat's Rue, which provides a beautiful white/lilac display and like the vetches and sweet pea, are part of the legume family. Also, on the heath you will see one of my favourites Dark Mullein with its yellow petals and dark pink and orange stamens, or look out for the small but stunning Scarlet Pimpernel. The next few months will also see the likes of the much maligned (although I don't have it in my garden), but beautiful Bindweed, with its large showy white trumpet flower and its more delicate relative the Field Bindweed with its attractive pink and white flowers. So many to look for Field Scabious, Burdock, Musk Mallow,

Common Ragwort, a favourite of the very attractive yellow and black Cinnabar caterpillar which transforms into the equally attractive red and black Cinnabar moth.

Over the next few months there will be many more plants to see, so keep on the look out, as you may spot something like the Corn Marigold that is on the vulnerable list but can sometimes be seen in the fields at Panshanger, or the unassuming and not particularly attractive Common Cudweed, which is part of the Daisy family and is on the near threatened list, but again can be seen in our local area, or listen out for the squawk of the Red Kite or the amazing whoop of the lapwings. Keep looking and listening there's lots out there and here's to some happy hunting and spotting on our doorstep. Enjoy.

boxes installed by the Hertford Swift Group. Here is an update on this year's arrivals.

We have been using call players to attract young Swifts to new boxes. These work with timers so the calls play early in the morning and in late evening. This method can work really well in getting young birds investigating boxes for future years. These are being used on All Saints and in St Andrews belfry at present. We hope to install a call kit in Holy Trinity church tower soon to attract Swifts to the nest boxes put up there.



Mature birds tend to be faithful to their nest sites. They only start breeding when 3-4 years old and young birds spend a shorter time than the adults here in their first few summers. They get to know the territory and are prospecting for future nest sites. They are the target audience! If they get a good look at the boxes they are more likely to be used in due course. Calls help a lot in attracting the birds to them.

There are Swift nests in Gosselin Road, around Parkhurst Road and around Port Vale among other places. A great spot to watch nesting Swifts is the rear of Wallace House in St Andrews Street (from the St Andrews Street car park) where there are 5 or 6 pairs in the eaves.

One Hertford house with 9 boxes has 5 pairs nesting this year. It took 3 or 4 years for these to start being used but this shows boxes will help over time.




Open Season and Afternoon Teas

In the morning, they participated in a Jubilee assembly and in the afternoon, they partnered up with their buddy class to enjoy celebrating. Each year group also looked at a decade of the Queen's life.

Mill Mead Primary School



As well as celebrating the Jubilee, there has been a lot going on at Mill Mead.

The Arts in Schools. We invited Stuart Mullins, an associate artist, from Hertford Theatre to come and observe a lesson. As part of their Listening Project, Mill Mead is using the Philosophy for Children (P4C) curriculum to generate conversation and debate about the arts. Stuart was struck by the insight and complexity shown by the class as to why the arts were invented. The children said: as humans we NEED to tell stories; it's a way of explaining and understanding ourselves and the world; it makes you feel happy and calm, making problems go away. All of these speak to our three key priorities, be it the state of our mental health and wellbeing, the status of the arts in schools and why teachers must be supported to teach and practice the arts.

Nursery found some snails last week which sparked a lot of in the moment learning.

This term has seen Reception dive to the bottom of the ocean, exploring The Coral Reef and the living creatures that lurk below. We created our own ocean aquariums, filling them with all of our favourite sea creatures.

Year 1 learnt all the different parts of a plant and we planted our own sunflower seeds. We are enjoying watching them grow. As part of our science week, we will be planting a fruit tree on the school field and some plants including lavender and herbs.

Year 2 went for a walk around Hertford, taking in the

historical sites as well as observing our human and physical geography. They went for a whole morning to Wodson Park where they faced many physical challenges, not least the wet weather! A lot of fun was had by all. Finally, the children thoroughly enjoyed their visit from ZooLab where they learnt all about a variety of animals and their very specific habitats.

Year 3 have been exploring the rainforest and its layers as well as writing an adventure story based on our class book. They let their hair down on our residential trip and had so much fun – zip lining and rock climbing as well as practicing bush craft and archery skills.

Year 4 have been exploring co-ordinates in Maths and played a treasure game at the end of the week to use all the skills they learnt. They looked at Roman numerals and recapped on how to read them before completing Tarsia puzzles. They used drama in English to help with explain text writing and all re-created a part to form a contraption from Wallace and Gromit.

Year 5 looked at solutions and mixtures and what happens when you combine substances. We had great fun with a balloon, vinegar and bicarbonate of soda!

Year 6 The class threw themselves into their holiday budget maths project – planning fully costed exotic trips to far-flung destinations including Tenerife, Majorca, Vienna and Tallinn. They loved devising their dream trips, complete with beach days, excursions, meals in fancy restaurants and even the occasional night on the tiles.

The assessment process includes examination of school data and key documents; lesson observations; and interviews with school leaders, learners, parents and governors.

A Word from The Rectory Sticky words

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



The partygate scandal is notable for the large number of column inches produced by so many journalists, none of whom were actually there. 'Never let the truth get in the way of a good story,' said Mark Twain – and we don't. Journalists channelled enough flashbulb memories and vivid snapshots from eyewitnesses to claim a high degree of certainty. But were they telling the truth?

The human memory is fallible. In our post-truth Trumpian world researchers are understandably interested in the way our brains are hard-wired to rapidly and automatically process opinions we agree with as if they were facts. We search for information that confirms our opinions. We cherry-pick the facts that support our point of view.


The research amounts to a rather troubling conclusion: that the interpretation of truth is dependent not upon the stories others tell, but upon the stories we tell ourselves. In that respect, a journalist's job has become rather like that of a vicar. We're all preaching to the converted.

Take it from a vicar, then – a preacher's task is to find reality, and I'm not yet cynical enough to despair of our discovering it. I don't believe everything I read in the newspapers, but like most people I want to believe at least some things – trivial things and profound things too. What people read helps form judgement and shape opinion, which is why it's so vital that papers take truth seriously.

Hence all the high hopes for the Sue Gray Report. Nick-named 'Deputy God', she was thrown into the limelight as the arbiter of Downing Street, and her report was the one everyone wanted to hear, demonstrating the importance – both to society and the individual – of the need for fact-finding and truth-telling. It might seem wise not to believe everything you read, but it's good not to have to doubt the veracity of everything that's printed. There are some stories that are too important not to be trusted.

For instance, if you read a story about a private function where, towards the end of the evening, a man turned six vats of water into wine, you'd probably want to get a few facts straight: Where did this happen? What day was it? Who was there? What was expected of them? Perhaps most importantly, Who was this guy?

Such an event is reported in some detail in John's Gospel. It was a wedding that took place on a Tuesday in Cana, where a man turned 180 gallons of water into a wine so good the host asked why the best stuff had been kept until last. As for the man's name...



Of course, there's every chance that someone made all of this up for the sake of a good story. Yet for some reason it's a story a lot of people still, 2,000 years on, believe and take seriously. For it's a story that appears in the book that many witnesses – media moguls, movie stars and ministers – hold in their hands to swear an oath, that 'the whole truth and nothing but the truth' be told and not be lost.


At the National Service of Thanksgiving for the Queen's reign last month, this same book was given

to Boris Johnson from which he read this passage from the Epistle to the Philippians: 'Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable... think about these things.'

Sticky words, those, but all the better to hang on to. The truth you stand on can be slippery.
