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### **Helping Hertford's Swifts**



Swifts are amazing birds that come here for 3 months every Summer (migrating to and from the Congo and Southern Africa), nesting in nooks and crannies – often under the eaves – in our buildings.

Parties of birds flying fast and low around Hertford rooftops have long provided a fantastic Summer spectacle. They are among the fastest birds – reaching 70mph in level flight.

The Swifts are in the Apodidae bird family (which also includes Hummingbirds). Apodidae translates as 'footless'. Swifts in fact have tiny feet but these are little used as they do not perch (unlike Swallows and House Martins which look similar but are not actually related). Swifts live – feeding, sleeping and even mating – in the air. They only leave the air to go to their nests, and they do not do this until they are three or four years old!

Sadly, Swift numbers are in steep decline (-50% in 25 years) due to a number of factors including the reduction in nesting sites as older buildings are modernised or demolished, and the reduced numbers of insects that are their food.

The Hertford Swift Group is working with interested people and organisations to try to help build their numbers up again. This includes commenting on new building developments with a view to getting Swift bricks or other integrated nest boxes included in plans, and providing nest boxes in suitable places on buildings across the town.

Swifts like to nest near to one another, so it makes sense to locate boxes in areas where there are still nests – St Andrews Street, Cowbridge and Port Vale for instance in central Hertford still have Swifts, and the Kingsmead allotments area is also good.



In Bengeo, houses in and around Gosselin Road have eaves perfectly suited for these birds and they can be seen well at Holy Trinity Church. So it was great news when the church agreed to have boxes installed. Thanks to Vicar Robert and to churchwardens Diana and Graham for their support on this. The boxes were thankfully(!) put up by steeplejacks at the end of July. Fingers crossed that they will have Swift residents before too long.

If you would like to find out more about Swifts and their

conservation in Hertford and elsewhere, and about how you can help, I will be giving a free talk at Bengeo Church Hall in Duncombe Road on 16th February at 7pm. Please contact me by emailing HertfordSwifts@gmail.com or phoning 07954 727133 if you would like to come.

I will also be organising Swift walks in the Summer to watch the birds and to look for nests. If you are interested in putting up boxes and attracting Swifts I am happy to advise at any time, so please do get in touch. ### Secret Society of Hertford Crafters' Christmas yarnbombing event



The Secret Society of Hertford Crafters (SSOHC) returned to bring Christmas spirit to Hertford and Ware residents, shoppers and businesses, while also raising money for the local branch of Samaritans.

SSOHC has yarnbombed 42 Royal Mail Postboxes with festive toppers: 27 in Hertford, 12 in Ware, 1 in Hertford Heath, 1 in Watton at Stone and 1 in Van Hage Garden Centre, with the locations of them on their website **www.ssohc.co.uk**.

For 2021, the festive designs feature gigantic festive Christmas Baubles, on top of the postboxes, with a surprise inside each bauble.

Hiding inside each bauble is a miniature mouse-themed scene. Each scene can be viewed through a mouse hole, cut into the bauble.

Some of mouse themes include:

- Brambly Hedge Mice, celebrating 40 years of publishing the 'Brambly Hedge' series of children's books
- Mice postmen, with thanks to all the Postal Workers and Royal Mail, for supporting SSOHC over the years



- **ID** Mice choristers in Church
- **D** Samaritans Mice hard at work
- Mexican Mice
- Mice on a train (outside Hertford East Station)
- **bb** Mice shepherds and sheep
- **IDD** Mice making a Christmas pudding

Photographs of all the baubles are shared over the festive period, on their website and social media channels.

"As yarnbombing by its nature is secretive and anonymous, it also feels slightly naughty going out in the dark to erect giant baubles on Postboxes – you don't get that many chances, especially later in life to be a bit naughty," said fellow yarnbomber, Anne Haworth.

"I am amazed at the skills I have learnt and re-learnt, working on our team's bauble. It's really taken me out of my crafting comfort zone. I have re-learnt how to use Plaster of Paris and papier mâché, I've learnt how to saw plumber's plastic piping and use more types of glue than I thought existed. The new craft skill I loved using most was découpage – glueing tissue paper and patterned napkins to the inside of my bauble, creating a wonderful decorated effect," said Jo Baily.

The 160 strong group split into small teams with a co-ordinator for each postbox topper who manages their own team, with smaller meetings making it easier to manage any cover-related issues.

"Not everybody does everything, some may knit a few squares, but it's a nice group with no one pressured into making 300 mice or even 1 mouse," she adds.

The designs change each year, and this year inspiration came from a crocheted bauble large enough to walk into which was sent into the group, and from there that became the Christmas bauble idea for this year.

For commuters coming into town, the baubles brighten their mornings.

"When they come into work in the morning, that's the first thing they see while stuck in traffic, and seeing the bauble, and then coming closer, walking or posting a letter and seeing what's inside," said Jo.

Between 2017 and now numbers have grown from 20 people in the first year, to numbers being boosted during the 100th year anniversary of the end of WW1 which adorned Hertford Castle in poppies, to 160 members now. The troop of yarnbombers are predominately women, with little success enrolling willing men, however the men involved are often partners working behind the scenes to do things such as wood cutting for props and tree cones for last year's projects.

"We have such a nice team, everyone's contribution is absolutely valued from knitted squares to making the infrastructure, so many people do so many different things, it's nice it's worked out that way," she said.

Recent media exposure has raised questions by some regarding how 'secret' the society is, but for them, it's all necessary to raise my money for good causes.

"It's nice to get the exposure [in national media] because we're raising funds for charity.

We are a secret society, and the bits that are secret are what, where and when we do it," she says.

"Proper yarnbombing is: 'one day it's not there, and one day it is', with surprise and delight, and feedback on social media. It spreads the joy, it's lovely and we don't want crowds," she continues.

After the festive season is over, the baubles are auctioned off to raise more funds for charity.




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### **BNAP Update**

### Bengeo Neighbourhood Area Plan



It has been a busy month for the Neighbourhood Plan team. We have had a couple of planning applications to comment on and we have been discussing how to take forward the community garden – see Veronica's report below. Part of this is setting up a charity to help with fundraising for community projects coming out of the neighbourhood plan.

### **Courtyard Arts extension**

Courtyard Arts Centre in Port Vale have submitted a planning application for a 'single storey rear extension and single storey partially glazed infill extension'. The aim of the extension is to provide a space for a reception area and cafe as well as a clay studio.

Plan Policy HBC4 states that 'Proposals for the development and expansion of cultural facilities will be supported, subject to compliance with other relevant policies in the development plan'.

We judged that the extension is a great addition to Courtyard Arts and supported the application. We suggested the addition of cycle racks and swift boxes. We noted the loss of 6 parking spaces but Courtyard Arts have assured us that this will not affect public parking allocation. Planning permission has now been granted for the extension.

### Thank you, Andrew

Bengeo Neighbourhood Plan want to recognise the huge contribution of Andrew Stevenson to both the Neighbourhood Plan and the area generally. Andrew was a great campaigner on Stop Bengeo Quarry and his contribution was important to the overall success of that campaign. He has also made many other important contributions including helping with the purchase of Beane Marshes. Although Andrew is no longer a County Councillor he is still active on the Neighbourhood Plan committee.

### **Bengeo Community Fund**

We have been ploughing through acres of documentation on the Charity Commission website and creating a governing document to set up a charity for fundraising for community projects. Veronica has also set in train the process to open a bank account. We have approached several people to be trustees on the charity (and are looking for more), but we still need a treasurer. So, if you are community minded and have financial skills this would be a small commitment – probably quarterly meetings and an annual set of accounts. Hidden on a narrow alley, on Balfour Street off Port Vale, halfway between Mill Mead Primary School and the Millstream Pub lies The Little Theatre, a surprisingly unknown gem of the amateur theatrical world. With a capacity of 63 seats, The Little Theatre produces up to 5 performances per year and is currently open and performing live. These are two of their upcoming productions but keep an eye on their calendar as they have more till the end of the season!

*Eventide* is an elegy set in the beer garden of a rural Hampshire pub, and tells the story of a disappearing England, set against the background of a funeral and a wedding, one year apart.

We meet three people, each at a juncture in their lives, uncertain of the way forward. John is a landlord forced to sell up; Liz a church organist that can't get a gig; Mark takes what work he can to pay the rent.

Their tales unfold round the back of The White Horse pub on the edge of The New Forest.

Replete with truthful, poetic dialogue and peppered with sharp humour and bad 'dad' jokes that prompt genuine belly laughs, it's perfectly suited to the intimacy of the Little Theatre.



artist's imagination. Each mundane cardboard box is 'unpacked': its myriad potentialities are explored, and it is transfigured into something extraordinary.



### On the Doorstep



The months of January and February can seem a dull and uninspiring time, with the trees bare and the flowers seemingly gone. However, there are plenty of natural things to hear, see and look forward to in these months, with their crispy, misty mornings and evenings.

The branches of the trees stretch upwards creating amazing patterns against the winter sky like the twiggy branches of the Silver Birch or the majestic Oak. On a crisp sunny day you might see the orangey, red branches of the Silver Poplar, Crack Willow or the bright yellow catkins of the hazel, contrasted against the sky and with the sun low in the sky you can enjoy the amazing long shadows cast over the winter landscape or on a snowy day the branches highlighted by snow.

As for flowers you may think that there would be none but with a mild winter the all year flowering ones like Common Daisy and Red Nettle can be found or some may have over wintered like the Red Campion or Yarrow. Then, as January and February progress the early flowering delicate drifts of Snowdrops can be found or the shiny bright yellow flower of the Lesser Celandine, that tracks the sun.

If you keep a really sharp eye out you might even see a Barn Owl and with the leaves gone and branches bare it maybe easier to spot deer like Muntjac, Fallow and Roe or keep your ears peeled and you may hear the tap tap of the Greater Spotted Woodpecker tapping to declare its territory.

So far from dull and uninspiring these months offer a wealth of nature right on our doorstep waiting for us to discover and enjoy.

### A Word from The Rectory Uphill from here

#### From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



According to researchers, happiness over the course of our lives is u-shaped. For the average Briton, the mountain highs peak at the ages of 20 and 70, while the valley lows bottom out at 49. So as l mark my 50th birthday this month I am ready to head to those promised sunlit hills of happiness, whilst looking over my shoulder and contemplating what

might have been, the tightening hamstrings and thickening waistline, and the fact that I will never make Archbishop of Canterbury.

Goodbye to all that. If the writer of the famous 23rd Psalm is to be believed, valleys are thick with shadows, a glum depression bedeviled with traps and hazards, bewilderment and deceit. No good place to hang around in. What the psalmist calls the valley, psychologists call a crisis: that creeping, subconscious mid-life stock-take where the over-reaching ambitions we had in our twenties have been passed through the audit of our lives and found wanting; the credibility gap between our dreams and their realization yawns like an abyss. We've been cooking the books of our expectations and now our bodies, our bank balances and our lack of accolades are telling us we've reached our peak and, from where we stand, it's barely a hill.

Dante divines this moment in his Inferno: 'In the midway of this our mortal life,' he says, 'I found me In a gloomy wood, astray; Gone from the path direct.' This from the original renaissance man, mature enough to know where he's at and honest enough to admit it's not where he should be. Hence the rush for a way out of the crisis, the otherwise inexplicable urge for a sports car, a visit to a cosmetic clinic or plans for some youth-yearning athletic challenge. If we can't find a way out of the valley, we'll be stuck gazing upwards in grudging envy towards the blessed doubt-free – the award-winners, the gifted ones, the beautiful people, those who've made it, who've scaled the heights without ever looking back.

Yet according to the research, the joy dip in mid-life affects us all – rich, poor; famous, anonymous; saint or sinner. In fact, the statistics suggest that unhappiness isn't attributable to a lack of material wealth or achievement. It even hints that going through the valley could be the best way forward. Those who make it out are not so much winners as survivors, having examined life and imagined a future that gets their expectations and hopes in line with reality. You should never waste a good crisis.

The writer of Ecclesiastes – the ultimate mid-life crisis manual – famously declared everything to be meaningless and that 'all is vanity'; but he didn't leave it there, wallowing in cool despair. He hints that we have been wired for something else: he



suggests that God planted eternity in every human heart, and that a life (or even half a life) lived in avoidance of this is what leads to a sense of pointlessness. True happiness has little to do with 'all things under the sun'; it lies in the unseen.

Behind much of mid-life angst there lurks the need – the want – to be loved. You can hear it in the teary histrionics of an Oscar acceptance speech, you can see it in the middle-aged man dragging himself

# FUTURE hope

Future Hope provides a mobile safe space for young people who meet in Hartham and Ware, this is an opportunity for young people venturing out into the evening with friends for the first time. Future Hope provides mentoring for young people and parents. Drug education into schools can also be arranged and delivered by Future Hope.

Funding for both groups has been provided by HDCT.

HDCT also give grants to local schools to purchase books or other media to assist with teaching about the Love of God.

Street Pastors have also had success in Hertford and Ware, with a small start-up funding from HDCT ensuring funding from Council and Police sources.

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
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
